Born in King, Ontario to Robert and Elizabeth (Ferguson) Gellatly. He was the younger brother of **Roger Gellatly**.

The death occurred in Fort William early on Saturday morning of Dr. Harvey Gellatly, brother of Miss Jessie Gellatly, King City, and Allan Gellatly, 4th concession, King. Dr. Gellatly had been in ill health since the spring, and in hospital since June. Miss Gellatly and her sister, Mrs. Alfred Smith of Toronto, left for Fort William on Saturday morning.

Born on the family farm on the 4th concession of King, the late Dr. Gellatly was the eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Gellatly. After graduating from dental college, Dr. Gellatly settled in Fort William where he has practised ever since. He visited his relatives in King and Toronto last summer.

Surviving are his widow, a son, Bruce, and a daughter, Marion. Both were married recently, Marion to Gordon Dee of Toronto, on May 24, and Bruce, whose wedding was about a month later. Dr. Gellatly attended his daughter's wedding but was unable to be present when his son was married. Surviving also are his brothers, Ernest of Willowdale; Roger of Toronto; Allan of the family farm; Mrs. A. Smith, Toronto; and Miss Jessie Gellatly of King City.

REMINISCENCES OF EVERSLEY, ONTARIO, King Township
by Alice A. Ferguson (1950)

On the walls of St Andrews Presbyterian Church at Eversley hang two Honour Rolls of the boys who took part in both Wars.. How well I remember we would meet every week to fill boxes of food and things for these boys, sew them up in cotton and send them off. Rev Robert Brydon was minister at this time with dear old Dr. Carmichael assisting. He had retired after 50 years of service to the Tawse Manse House next to the Church. For 50 years he had lived at Strange, in the house that the congregation had built for him when he came to St Andrews Church in 1860 as the assisting minister to Rev John Tawse whose health was failing.

The Sunday School was flourishing and the Young People's Society and the Church Services were well attended every Sunday. All members of the families would attend divine worship, sometimes two pews were allotted to one family.
